There is a large oak tree in this cemetery. Elder David Wortman (buried here) lived in a tent under this tree. A man, Patrick Dolan, and his daughter who were crossing the country stopped here on their way, and stayed the night with Elder David Wortman. David and the daughter, Elizabeth, fell in love, were married and made their home under this oak tree until they built a permanent home .5 mile away. The Dolans were related to the Patrick Dolans who used to live in this area. David and Elizabeth's Wortman's daughter married James Broyles and they lived in the house with her parents until the parents' death. Mettie Broyles Williams and Mrs. Harvey Broyles are sisters. Mrs. Alta Huffman is the daughter of Mrs. Mettie Williams. One daughter of the Broyles, Louise was living in 1979 in a Milan nursing home. She will be the last to be buried here. History: Dec. 9, 1849 Richard Gatewood of Fayette County, KY, trustee for Jane Gatewood Allen, his daughter, purchased from the Government 1750 acres of land in northwestern Adair County, MO, with the \$1200.00 estate of Jane Meaux, the aunt of Jane Gatewood Allen. Richard Gatewood deeded this land to his daughter, Jane, Oct. 3, 1852. There was 160 acres for each of her 10 children and 160 acres for herself. On Oct. 31, 1871 Jane Gatewood Allen deeded her daughter Sarah Elizabeth Allen Claybrook, 320 acres. On May 1, 1900, Sarah deeded to her two sons 160 acres each. The west 160 acres to Samuel H. Claybrook, except one acre for cemetery purposes where the remains of several persons are buried.

**Added NOTE from [Steve](#)**

Dear Claudia and Carey,

I have found the answers to my questions and have information for both of you.

Per the 1997 Miller Management Services Map, pg 13, Township 63N Range 16W, found in Kirksville City Hall map(?) office, the only part of the description that's accurate is that it is on the Willingham farm and we did find stones. A distant cousin, showed me the cemetery's location last June, but it was 2.3 miles away as the crow flies from the physical description. I will give a better description below. The erroneous physical description is repeated on a map in the new "Novinger (Adair County) Missouri:" book on page 658, grid E5, location number 18. We tried to get access to that location only to find the east entry road impassible by auto, and the west entry road gated and locked. We left a note in a zip-lock bag on the gate's lock in hopes of making contact with the owner. We had to leave for home (California) the next day.

Today, I received a phone call from the present owner of that farm where I left the note. The Turkey Creek and Spring Creek mentioned in the physical description join together there. He told me that long ago, the bridge was destroyed by a heavy load crossing it, and was never replaced. He says that a very old woman says some graves are in this area. There is an old house on this property that was once used as a temporary schoolhouse when the schoolhouse in Stahl(?) burned down. The woman as a girl going to the school was told of the graves (near a

bluff?) and to stay away from them. He plans to find the graves and see who is really buried there. He has a veterinary practice about two blocks from the Kirksville Library and just loves to talk about history. If there are grave on this property, these may be added to the website as a new discovery.

As far as the Cook-Sibole Cemetery, I would like to offer this correction. I'm not sure of the manner locals describe the roads/routes, but the numbers themselves are correct:

This cemetery is on the Willingham farm (1997), west of Connelsville. From junction of State 6 and 149 at Novinger, go north on 149 for 2.9 miles and turn left (west) on Route 162, which is a gravel road. Go 0.8 mile on 162 then turn right on Route 163 (northwest). Continue for 1.5 miles and turn left (south) at an unnamed farm access road. The graves are located among trees on the left approximately 0.1 mile down the access road and about 10 feet east of the road. Take precautions for ticks in season.

My cousins, of Kirksville, returned to the gravesite last December to take more pictures after the trees dropped their leaves. They discovered that someone had cleared all the overgrown vines and bushes, and had cleaned and reset the stones. Pictures taken last summer show one stone was set deep, and new picture shows it raised and was apparently had been broken off and repaired. Now is a great time to look at the graves.

This physical location would be on the map in the new Novinger book page 658, grid G5, at the 2 o'clock position at the edge of the circle enclosing the number 5.

Other corrections to the text (in RED) of the small cemeteries web page, some even from the original book, death dates are from stones, birth dates estimated/verified using years: months: days as stated on the stones:

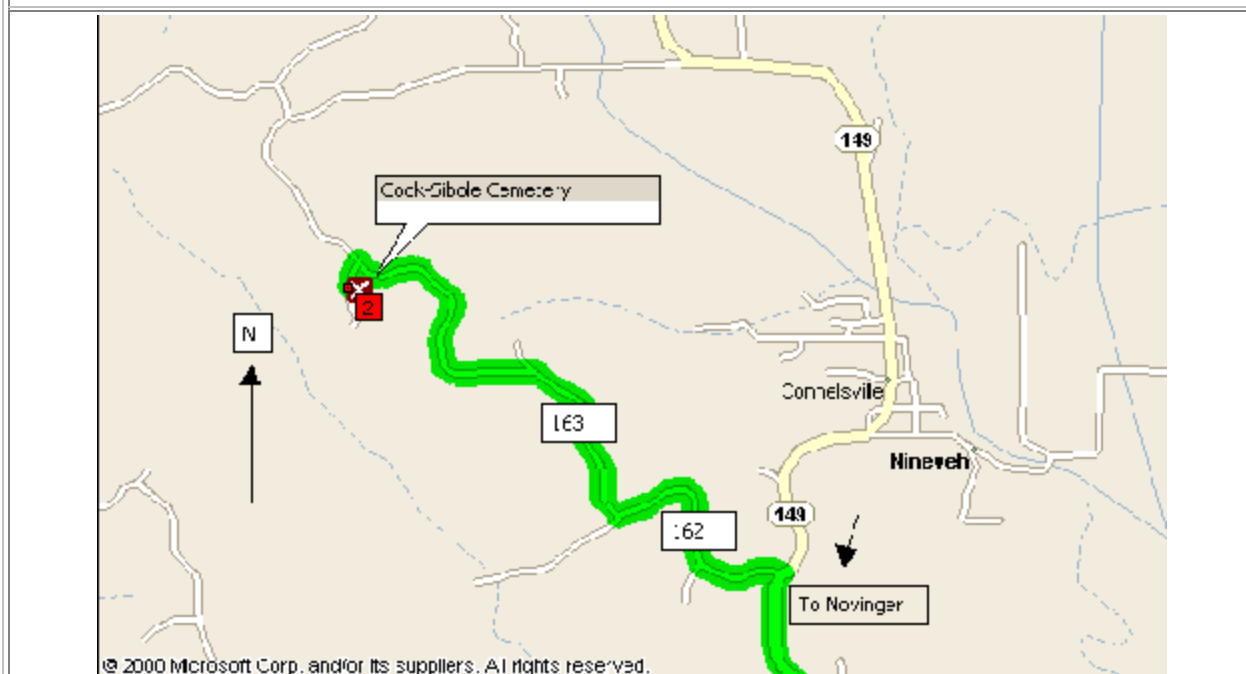
